**Description:** Cool season clumping grass, also referred to as 'Stricta'. An exclamation point for the garden, especially beautiful when viewed backlit by sun, adds graceful swaying in the wind. Long lived. Grows quickly in cool spring and fall weather, going dormant in summer heat. Tolerates Black Walnut.

Maintenance: Cut to one-third the original height in late winter before spring growth appears.

Deeper cutting delays growth. Divide in early spring every 2-3 years, if centers die back.

Nitrogen fertilizer causes seedheads to flop over.
