Growth Habit: Small roundish dense shrub

Use: Color and textural interest, along dry-stream beds, borders firescaping, excellent in container or bonsai

Description: Small shrub with bright flowers and showy fruit that is more decorative than tasty.

Tolerates wind, heat and frost, but tips will defoliate and die in prolonged freezes.

Maintenance: Blooms and fruits on new wood.

Prune late winter, removing weak, dead, and crossing branches from inside; tip-trim to encourage bushiness; fertilize with balanced food for fruit trees. Performs well near lawns.
