Description: Plants send out strong stems called canes, then flower and fruit the second year. Harvest in summer. Disease and pest resistant. Maintenance: Prune to control length of canes and number of buds. Tie to a trellis to make harvesting easy. Cut canes that fruited to ground and mulch with compost or composted manure in late fall.
